"Crystal Clean" said she goes into the schools and gives

programs to children relative to keeping the community clean. She said she uses what is called an

"environmental danger protector" to zap litter.

® A. Ordinance No. 1676 - Second reading of an ordinance

amending Chapter 12-A of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Asheville with regard to floodplain regulations.

Mayor Bissette said the Federal Emergency Management

Agency has adopted new final rules which require changes in local ordinances with regard to flood plain regulations. The North Carolina Department of Crime Control and Public Safety has prepared model ordinances for local communities to use in revising their flood plain regulations. This ordinance will revise the City's flood plain ordinance to comply with federal regulations. This ordinance passed on first reading on

February 23, 1988.

Mayor Bissette said this ordinance was previously read

and will not be reread in its entirety.

Verl Emrick, Director of Planning, said a draft of the

ordinance was sent to Raleigh and tentative approval has been received.

The City Manager said no opposition has been received

relative to the ordinance.

second reading.

®IV. NEW BUSINESS:

® A. Ordinance No. 1679 - An Ordinance amending Chapter 13

of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Asheville entitled "Garbage and Refuse"

Mayor Bissette said this ordinance amends Chapter 13 of

the Code relative to littering; accumulation, removal of weeds, trash, refuse, and other material; debris; trash; and rubber tires.

Mayor Bissette said this ordinance was previously

presented to members of Council and will not be read in its entirety.

Charles Penny, Assistant City Manager, highlighted the

major changes in the ordinance in relation to the current ordinance.

Upon inquiry of Council, Mr. Penny said junk vehicles

are not covered by this particular ordinance.

Council members expressed a real commitment to having

strict enforcement of this ordinance and to clean up the community.

Councilman Price said she felt an effort should be made

to encourage citizens not to put out their garbage until the actual pick-up day.

LaRue Bolick, with Quality Forward, said there is a need

to encourage downtown business owners to clean up around their businesses and to keep their dumpster doors closed.

Evelyn Wyatt, from the Montford Community, suggested

that the City contract with neighborhood communities to clean up vacant lots in their particular area.

Ralph Bishop commented about the littering on Kenilworth

Knoll Road. He said he believes the litter is coming from the Carolina Sports Club and McGuffy's.

After discussion, Councilman Bratton moved for the

adoption of Ordinance No. 1679. This motion was seconded by Councilman Price.

® C. Approval of bids for Automobiles and Trucks for the

Police Department, the Planning Department and the Public Works Department.

Mayor Bissette said the bids were received for fourteen

(14) patrol (blue and white), (3) unmarked police vehicles for the Police Department; one (1) mid-size sedan for the Planning Department and two (2) 3/4 ton four wheel drive pick-ups for the Public Works Department. Staff recommends the acceptance of the following bids: 14 each Police Vehicles - Patrol (blue and white) for the Police Department, Harrelson Ford, Inc. for 1988 Ford LTD Crown Victoria at \$12,118.25 each =\$169,655.50; 2 each police vehicles - unmarked for Police Department, Harrelson Ford, Inc. for 1988 Ford LTD Crown Victoria at \$11,725.00 each for a total of

\$23,450.00; 1 each police vehicle - unmarked with Cruise Control for Police Department, Harrelson Ford, Inc. for 1988 Ford LTD Crown Victoria at \$11,839.00; 1 each mid-size sedan for Planning Department, Harrelson Ford, Inc. for 1988 Ford Taurus at \$10,053.00

Mayor Bissette said it was his understanding that there

was concern expressed relative to awarding this bid to an out of town firm. He said this matter was discussed with the local dealer and the city staff has researched the law to see if the City could give preference to a

local dealer. He said the staff also checked with the Institute of Government relative to the City giving preference to a local dealer over the low bid firm.

The City Manager said from the research it was

determined that giving preference to a local dealer was not criteria to use in not awarding a bid to a low bidder.

After discussion, Vice-Mayor Michalove moved to accept

the recommendation to award the bids to Harrelson Ford, Inc. This motion was seconded by Councilman Martin and carried unanimously.

Fair Housing Commission to carry out the program.

1988 for the Southern Conference Basketball Tournament.

Mayor Bissette said the Southern Conference

Basketball Tournament will be held in the Asheville Civic Center on March 4, 5, and 6, 1988. The capacity of the Civic Center Parking Garage is 600 cars. The number of persons attending the Southern Conference Basketball Tournament exceeds this capacity. It is the desire of the City of Asheville to encourage attendance at this tournament and to make parking as convenient as possible. The Asheville City Council has determined that the best solution to this

problem is to provide on-street parking without the necessity of leaving the Civic Center from time to time in order to feed the

meters.
